University Students from Hiroshima University

On Wednesdays 7 and 14 March, 30 Japanese first year university students visited our school. They came from a wide range of faculties that included engineering, education, medicine and finance. St Heliers School has a close relationship with the University of Auckland, and this has become an annual event for us.

On arrival at our school, Mrs Odie Johnson provided a Maori welcome followed by a lesson in Te Reo and Tikanga. The Hiroshima University students thoroughly enjoyed learning the poi and stick games and learning about Maori culture. Their second block of time was spent in each of our Year 3 and 4 classrooms, where the Japanese students observed classroom work and began to form relationships with the children in that room.

The students returned on Wednesday 14 to the same classroom of the previous week. They had a lot of fun teaching our children a Japanese game. This cultural exchange was beneficial to us all.

Year 1&2 Mt Albert Grammar Farm Trips

On Tuesday 13 and Friday 16 March, Year 1&2 headed to Mount Albert Grammar School to see a small working farm in action.

The children were greeted by the farm manager Mr Brett Harris and farm dog Suki - who was a huge hit with the children!

After morning tea, the children were able to watch and even get up close to the 5 milking cows on the farm. On the Friday 'Speckles' was unfortunately a little nervous and not as keen for visitors. The milk was then used to feed the 3 week old calves and the 4 month calves who were just about to be weaned.

After this we all helped feed the pigs and chickens before a question and answer session with Mr Harris and making links to our inquiry learning this term 'From farm to home'. Did you know that most NZ wool is used for carpets although nylon and other man made fabrics have had a huge impact on this industry. The 16 ewes at the farm only generated \$27 worth of wool this season.

It was lovely to see the excitement of our youngest students engrossed in their learning and some overcoming nerves to be up close to the farm animals.

Year 4 River Talks Trip to Glen Innes and The Omaru River

As part of ongoing study into our Term One Inquiry, Responsible Citizenship: Is Who I See The Very Best That I Can Be? Year 4 students and teachers travelled to the banks of the Omaru River in Glen Innes to witness a striking multi-media arts and science production created by Ngati Whatua Orakei and the Mad Ave Community Trust.

It was all based around the sustainability of natural resources in East Auckland and the responsibility of future generations to ensure this continues. This is a locally led eco-event was specifically designed for children and young people. It included local New Zealand artists, a discussion of local Maori heritage and connection to the river, scientific inquiry demonstrations by Tamaki Redevelopment and the Auckland City Council and immediate environmental action urged by local ecologists.

St Heliers School, Point England Primary and Ruapotaka School students were greeted with a dramatic and interactive powhiri and waiata. They were later entertained by performers from both the Cook Islands and New Caledonia. The arts performances were interlaced with scientific and ecological research on the progress of the renewal of the Omaru River as a source of food, recreation and community.

Special mention should be made to the dynamic and entertaining Tamati Patuwai and his whānau. Both the hikoi along the banks of the Omaru River and the entertainment, displays and korero about the river's sustainability were of a very high standard.

Students were put into groups with accompanying parents and teachers to explore the zoo and attend 3 education sessions. All students had the opportunity to hear specifically about the cheetahs, flamingos and elephants. The education sessions were very informative and the students came away buzzing with lots of new information. Did you know that when flamingos are born they are actually grey not pink. However, when they eat blue green algae and shrimp they turn pink! The educational teachers were impressed with the level of questioning from the students. There were plenty of photo opportunities during our visit including watching the animals in the education sessions, exploring the zoo, watching animals such as the meerkats being fed and group photos.

At present the 'Bug Lab' is based at the zoo and students were able to look around this for an hour exploring the works from Weta Workshop. There were impressive 3D bug models, such as what is in a hive and what is in a flower. As well as this there were interactive activities and students were able to touch meal worms or beetles. The students thoroughly enjoyed being able to experience both opportunities and build on their knowledge and understanding.
