Attendance Data


The Ministry of Education produce attendance data for NZ Schools through their website 'Education Counts.' During my address at this year's Meet the Teachers' Evening, I presented our attendance data for Term 2, 2020 which was the term most affected by lockdowns due to Covid-19. Our attendance data for that term was extremely high.

The Ministry has just released Term 3, 2020 attendance data, and once again the attendance data for our school continues to be extremely strong which is encouraging on several fronts. The data indicates the positive, happy environment that staff create for children to want to attend school, the engagement of children once at school and the importance parents place on quality education for their children.

The table below is Term 3, 2020 attendance data where you will find a comparison of attendance in at St Heliers against schools across the country, schools in our region and decile.

Senior School Council

Our next step is to complete this audit identifying our strengths and areas that we can improve on. Then we will create an action plan on what the Senior Councillors consider to be our first goals.

Eastern Songbird Autumn Bird Count

On Wednesday 12 May, eight Senior School Councillors joined Mrs Torrie and Mrs Wood on a bird count mission in Dingle Dell. We listened very carefully to bird calls and recorded what we had heard during three five-minute intervals. This count allows the Songbird Association to keep track of the increased impact predator control has on birdlife in the Eastern Bays. The aim is to develop a database over several years to monitor changes in bird populations in our communities.

Year 4 Rocky Shore Study

On Monday 12 April, as part of the Year 4 ongoing inquiry studies into 'Kaupapa Moana/Our Responsibility To The Ocean', students, teachers and a truly wonderful group of parent supervisors walked from School to Kohimarama Beach to be there at the exact point of low tide with three objectives in mind.

Firstly, to explore the rock pools and shoreline for any fascinating and diverse sea life. Secondly to collect and

collate any rubbish found, and thirdly to sketch and identify the various landmarks that form the beautiful environment which is part of our local community.

It was a beautiful and warm late summer afternoon as we left St Heliers School promptly at 12:45pm to walk to the glorious Kohimarama Beach. Rangitoto loomed magnificent in the background with an impressive blue sky and iconic long white cloud above it as the children diligently explored, discovered, and finally sketched their local environment.



Among the sea life discovered at Kohimarama Beach were hermit crabs, tiny translucent shrimps and vulnerable baby fish who had become trapped amongst the rocks and seaweed as the tide retreated. Unfortunately, among the rubbish collected were many plastic straws, plastic bottles, one-use coffee cups, discarded items of clothing, partial fishing nets and fishing lures, and even a pink 3kg exercise hand weight!

The behaviour and focus of the children throughout the excursion were outstanding, with many members of the community smiling or waving as the students passed and politely greeted them along Tamaki Drive and

on our way back up the hill to school. Year 4 teachers appreciated the positive and reliable support of all the parent supervisors throughout the afternoon. It was an educational, worthwhile, and memorable trip.

Year 5 Pak'nSave Visit

The Year 5 Term 1 inquiry was based around responsible citizenship. As part of the inquiry we investigated healthy eating and sensible food choices for basic nutrition at this level as the children become more independent and responsible for their own health and wellbeing. We studied the 'Food for Thought' programme sponsored by Foodstuffs, who provided us with a nutritionist for 2 classroom sessions, then a trip to Glen Innes Pak'nSave. At the supermarket, the children worked in groups to research nutritional values stated on food labels and decide on the healthiest options. This led to many in depth discussions, and lots of ideas of what could be done to make their favourite 'naughty treats' healthier. *Miss Jackson Y5 Team Leader*

Kaupapa Moana: Sea Cleaners Presentation to St Heliers Students

On Monday 10 May the Year 1, 3 and 4 teams attended a presentation from Hayden Smith, a member of the volunteer agency 'Sea Cleaners' as part of combined inquiries, based around environment, ocean and sea creatures.

Hayden talked to the students about different ways the Sea Cleaners volunteer teams collaborate to try to tackle the ongoing environmental crisis caused by manmade rubbish ending up in the oceans, seas, estuaries, and creeks all around Aotearoa and the Pacific Islands. There were some shocking facts shared - a turtle who was discovered in the Pacific Islands with over 150 pieces of plastic in its stomach - with many of the pieces of rubbish traced back to New Zealand, an embalmed snake found in a large jar that had been dumped in the Tamaki Estuary and dumping abandoned tyres and other plastic debris off the Coromandel Coast.

Sea Cleaners volunteer teams are responsible for removing 120 cubic metres of manmade rubbish from the ocean to date.

Hayden also answered a range of questions from the children and

encouraged the students to have a more positive impact on the environment by helping reduce the need for the collection of manmade rubbish along the shoreline. He showed them how making incremental changes in their behaviour and food & food wrapper choices can be a powerful start.

Year 4 students responded immediately the next day to Hayden's request by re-establishing their goal of plastic free St Heliers School by reducing the amount of plastic in their lunchboxes and picking up every piece of rubbish they see when out in the community.

The children wrote thank you letters to Hayden Smith and Sea Cleaners pledging their commitment to change, and by doing so, help clean up and save their natural world! Miss Mill Y4 Team Leader

Auckland Blue Light PCT (Police Competency Test) Challenge 2021

Each year, Auckland Police run a fantastic event in which schools send a team of four senior students to compete against other schools in challenges that are same as, or similar to the PCT. This year we were represented by Year 8 students:

There were some amazing team times recorded in the PCT, some amazing teamwork and communication shown during the police crime scene challenge and some huge individual efforts in the Police aptitude test elements. Our team competed extremely well, placing third.

Our parent supervisor commented 'They were a delight to look after. They organised themselves and had such great manners.'

Year 6 Museum Trip - Citizen Science Investigations (CSI) Pukekawa

This term Year 6 are learning about biodiversity and adaptations for inquiry. Last Thursday Year 6 students went to Auckland Museum to participate in the CSI Pukekawa Programme. Two classes went in the morning and the others in the afternoon. The classes swapped over halfway from participating in the educational programme or looking through displays throughout the museum.

Many students enjoyed seeing the ANZAC displays after learning about it in class at the start of this term. Each class had an hour's lesson with a museum educator in the native bush in Auckland Domain.

We were introduced to the app iNauralist on the ipad and then students worked in small groups and took photos of fungus, trees, bugs, spiders and birds that they found. Students had lots of fun moving around the leaf litter and seeing what was under it.

The photos that were taken were uploaded when we got back to the museum and sent to scientists around the world. Year 6 successfully uploaded 295 photos. In a couple of weeks' time, we will receive a report from the scientists about all the different species of flora and fauna the students identified.

The educator's feedback was 'I particularly loved the enthusiasm the students showed, some even wanted to continue after the session itself!'
