One thing in particular that we noticed that Cam said, was "if you are nice to people, those people will be nice back to you no matter if you are disabled". After we listened to Cam, Brooke Neal came on stage. She is a former Blackstick who



went to the 2016 Rio Olympics. Brooke also has a Commonwealth Games gold medal to her name. After we heard this we were all expecting her to talk about some of her hockey experiences, but we were wrong. She used the concept of a duck when she was speaking. Ducks look like they glide across the water but in reality, they actually struggle underwater with their legs. What Brooke meant was that everyone struggles with some things, but there are some people that do not like to show their struggles to the wider world. In her early days Brooke was one of these people.

Some things that stood out to us were the fact that she said that "success does not come in a straight line". After Brooke gave us a motivational speech it was time for morning tea. Outside we went for a feast. As always, Mrs Herbert delivered, supplying us with Fruit Bursts and Marshmallows (3). 




Year 2 visit from Native Bird Experts


Earlier this term, the Year 2 children had a visit from Nicky Elmore, Sustainable Schools at Auckland Council, to talk about the Eastern Songbird Trust and how we can make a positive impact on our native bird population by planting native trees and making us aware of pests and predators that threaten their extinction. We have been contemplating enhancing our garden space outside the Year 2 block and Nicky showed us how we could make 'tracking tunnels' and 'bite cards' to check if our area was predator free. The Eastern Songbird Trust has also told us that if we were to provide them with the information we collect about our garden predators, that they may be able to give us some funding toward making our garden space native bird friendly.





Later in the term Emma-Kate Paul, one of our school parents, came in to talk to us about a native bird and its predators too. Through her role at Genesis Energy, Emma-Kate was able to share her expert knowledge of the Whio, the native New Zealand blue duck. Genesis Energy and the Department of Conservation have been working together since 2011 to secure the future of the Whio through the 'National Whio Recovery Project.' The children were particularly excited to check out some predator exhibits that Emma-Kate was able to bring along.


